

As I take another look I wonder if the shoes are too clean? Where is the mud? The messiness of life? Have we made vocation too sterile? Is it messier than we first imagine?






Low Sunday April 2022

- Includes insights from other people, songs, readings, pictures, nature
- Incorporates theological learning and reading
- Element of wondering? Asking questions
- Searching and going deeper
- Progression of thought, learning and spiritual growth over time

• Makes links between life experiences and scripture and uses scripture to bring meaning and

- Reflection shows critical thinking and questioning
